
# The half-term break gave us a chance to recharge our batteries, and Form 1

It was on the 5<sup>th</sup> November 1605 that Guy Fawkes was caught below the Houses of Parliament with barrels of gunpowder, his aim was to kill King James I. He did not succeed and King James announced that we would celebrate his failure each year - now known as Bonfire Night. Form 1 had great fun listening to his story and created lovely pieces of writing. They experimented with forks to create firework pictures, dipped marshmallows in chocolate sauce and sprinkles to create 'sparklers', and developed their handwriting skills by writing the poem 'Remember, Remember, the 5<sup>th</sup> of November'.

#### Eco School





With Bonfire Night and Diwali approaching please consider the following:

- Burn natural materials such as wood, leaves and cardboard. Burning plastic, rubber or toxic paint can release dangerous chemicals into the air.
   Buy Eco-friendly fireworks. The plastic in traditional fireworks disintegrates into smaller pieces and litters the land and water, threatening wildlife.
- Buy quiet firework. Bonfire night can be a distressing time for animals, as well as people with PTSD, young children and the elderly.
- Never release sky lanterns. Sky (or Chinese) lanterns may look pretty in the sky. But once they fall back to earth, they're deadly to wildlife. Animals can become entangled in their metal wire frames and trapped. And, when ingested, these frames can tear and puncture an animal's throat or stomach.
- Clean up thoroughly afterwards.
